God *doesn't* make *mistakes*

For many of us we may wonder about this statement that God doesn't make mistakes.

We look at our disabilities and say, "God, what happened surely this was a mistake?". We may have been born with our disability or had an illness or accident. This has disrupted our lives completely, learning to cope with wheelchairs, crutches or whatever aid we may need. We feel like we are different and maybe not accepted by society because of the way we look or maybe the behaviours that the disability produces. But nothing is a surprise to God. He knows our struggles, and He doesn't make mistakes. We are created in God's image, and He loves and cares about us. We see only the reverse side of the tapestry of life but God sees the full picture, so we have to trust Him that He knows best.

While lying in a bed in a third world hospital in the Philippines thinking each day that I was going to die, I had lots of time to ponder on what had happened to me. "Lord, you brought me to the Philippines to minister to those with disabilities, and now only eight months later I lie here so sick, unable to do anything for others, and barely able to look after myself. Lord, has there been a mistake? God I don't know why this is happening to me, but I trust you, and I know that You don't make mistakes."

Now let us look at an example from Scripture about a man who could easily have asked God what are you doing? But at the end of the story we see that God was certainly in control. Let's look at the life of Joseph. In Genesis 37 we read in verses 2 - 11. Joseph's brothers hated him, they made a plan to get rid of him. Verse 28. Joseph must have wondered what was going on. He could have asked God why is this happening to me? Joseph was sold to traders who took him to Egypt, and there sold to Potiphar, an official of Pharaoh.

In Genesis ch 39 Joseph prospered. Potiphar was really pleased with him and put him in charge of the household. But it wasn't long before trouble came. Potiphar's wife took a liking to Joseph, she wanted him to go to bed with her. Joseph fled from this situation leaving behind his cloak. Potiphar's wife made up a big story that Joseph had tried to rape her, but that she screamed and Joseph fled and she had the cloak as proof. For this Joseph was thrown into prison. Joseph may have wondered why this was happening to him. He was innocent and yet he found himself in prison. He could have asked, "Isn't this a mistake God? I didn't do anything wrong."

Verse 23 tells us - "the Lord was with Joseph



and gave him success in whatever he did." Joseph had been in prison two years before it came to Pharaoh's attention that Joseph could interpret dreams through God's guidance. Pharaoh had some disturbing dreams, and Joseph was able to interpret them. Pharaoh then took him from prison and put him in charge of the whole of Egypt. Genesis ch 41 v 41. So things seemed to be really good for Joseph. He was in charge of gathering all the grain to store up, as there was according to the dream going to be seven years of plenty and then seven years of famine. In ch 42 we see the brothers coming to Egypt to buy grain as the famine was severe. Joseph recognised his brothers but they didn't know who he was. Joseph spoke roughly to them and accused them of being spies.

Ch 42 V 21 says " The brothers said to one another, surely we are being punished because of our brother. We saw how distressed he was when he pleaded with us for his life, but we would not listen. That's why this distress has come upon us." The brothers recognised their mistake and acknowledged it. Joseph could have said, "Oh good, now I can get my revenge on my brothers for what they did to me". But we don't see this at all.

Genesis Ch 45 Joseph makes himself known to his brothers, not with hate but with love and forgiveness. Verse 2 says "Joseph wept so loudly that all the household heard it". Then we see the whole family shift to Egypt where there is plenty of food for them and their livestock. Then we come to Genesis Ch 50 and Jacob, Joseph's father, has died. The brothers were afraid that now their father was dead that Joseph would take some revenge on them. But Joseph said to them in verse 20, "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good."

So we see God doesn't make mistakes. He has a plan for each of our lives. We may not be able to see the reason why bad things happen to us, but be assured that God is still in control, and He doesn't make mistakes.

Change in Allocation of Helpers

Over the years it has been a blessing for many people attending our camps to be provided with helpers. The camper/helper relationship is foundational to how our camps function, and we will continue to provide volunteer helpers for campers needing general support and basic assistance.

Due to changes in Health and Safety requirements and the level of training needed to safely provide assistance, we now require campers with a higher level of care to bring their own caregiver, appropriate friend or family member. This includes campers with complex care needs, those who use a hoist to transfer, or those needing significant assistance to transfer.

IDEAS OF WHAT YOU CAN DO FOR DISABILITY AWARENESS SUNDAY If you have a person with a disability in your congregation, or a family with a child with a disability, get them to give their testimony, or tell how they cope with God's help, or interview them. (Some may have a hidden disability such as epilepsy or mental health issues.)

2 Someone who is blind or visually impaired could read from a Braille Bible a portion, or someone could sign a portion to a deaf person. 3 Get someone to interact with the congregation, asking them questions such as, how would you cope with a wheelchair in your house, or going into a restaurant, etc

Interview any medical folk in your church: nurses, doctors, physios, 'OT's about their experiences with people with disabilities.

Mariana Onofia shares of her role:

I am the Office Assistant at the National Support Office, the headquarters for Elevate.

I was born and raised in Auckland and have lived my whole life here. I am Samoan, and live with my mum and two sisters. I accepted Christ as my Lord and Saviour early in high

school, and have been walking with the Lord ever since. I came to Elevate in August 2013 as a volunteer. By then I had completed a course in Administration at UNITEC, and was working at a call centre. I was completely new to Elevate and what it was about, and since I volunteered on a Friday, for the rest of that year I didn't know about the Drop In Centre or the kind of people involved in it. People with disabilities and disability issues had little to do with my everyday life. I went from volunteering on and off on Fridays to being the Office Assistant at the National Support Office, working Tuesdays to Thursdays during the NZ school calendar.

The best thing about my role is the variety of things I get to do; it's definitely not a traditional workload. The core of my role (other than assisting others) surrounds "The

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Ireat everyone with politeness. not because they are nice

I have a concern for reality, that we don't bury our heads in the sand. God's people are not exempt from suffering. It is an integral part of our spiritual journey. Life isn't one hilarious roller-coaster ride. Everyone experiences trials and testing. It may be radical surgery or terminal illness, financial ruin, ridicule in Christian ministry, sexual abuse. It could be one of a thousand other things. Now, in those critical and desperate situations, how does a person connect with God? How do we discern His plan – His purpose?

Sometimes it is difficult for us to foresee the fulfilling of His purpose in our life, especially when troubles crowd in upon us. Allow me to ask, is it sin to clench one's fist and scream, "God, why did you allow this to happen?" God allows our 'whys' when we ask with an open hand, not a clenched fist. A clenched fist demonstrates anger – and rebellion. An open hand expresses SURRENDER.

One of my favourite Bible characters is Job. I have drawn enormous comfort and encouragement as I've pondered the intensity of his struggles, heartaches and hardships, his striving to be understood, his prolonged questionings, and his demands for answers. By delving into Scripture, I've discovered a number of thought-provoking principles that God wove into the fabric of this man's life and character, and my own faith has been both stretched and strengthened.

Let's look at Job chapter one verses 1 to 20. The first characteristic to note is that Job was a man of perfection. He was a man that God said was blameless - absolutely blameless! Now, that was God's description of him - not mine, not the neighbour's. It's God's! Job was no hypocrite. He was a man of deep moral and spiritual calibre and character, and God said: "there's none like him." What a reference! Yet God did not mark out for Job a life of ease to acknowledge his achievement. There was no problem with sin that we know of, so the spotlight focused in on self. Was Job perhaps a self-righteous man? Could it be that God wanted to spotlight this and deal with it? We are not told this, and we are speculating, nevertheless there are some valid thoughts to be drawn.

Paul writes for us, in Philippians Chapter 3 verse 10. "That I might Know Him, and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings."

THROUGH FIRES OF ADVERSITY

In God's university of adversity the books are bumps and the colours are black and blue. Isn't it true, that in adversity we usually want God to do the removing job, when His aim is to do the improving job?

Allow me to suggest: What we learn to overcome here on earth is preparation for ruling and reigning in eternity. Let's not fantasize – Heaven is not about sitting on fluffy-candy floss clouds, playing golden harps. We are going to a higher calling: to rule and reign with Christ. Now, doesn't that blow your tiny mind?



And, in Romans Chapter 8 verse 17, we read: "I also share in His glory." We tend to enthusiastically "Amen" the sharing in His glory, but we are much more cautious when it comes to the fellowship of His sufferings.

In reality, few of God's people are prepared to walk through fires of adversity. The majority of us can't actually handle a toothache! To know God in His holiness and the perfection of His purposes was something Job was required to know – and we need to know it too!

Job is tested in specific areas: It is useful for us to bring Job's example into our own specific circumstances. I live in Te Puke, a town which has been modestly described as the Kiwifruit Capital of the World. How would any farmer around me react – how would you react - if someone came racing in and said: "There's just been a thunderbolt and it's wiped out all your kiwifruit?" Within minutes, financial prosperity turns to ruin. It's every kiwifruit farmer's nightmare. But that's not all. You're just in recovery from that crushing blow when someone else arrives with the news! "Lightning hit your house and your kids are all dead"! Imagine the loss, the grief, the emotional suffering! And, it's not over. Next - another person rushes in: "Your car, your truck have just been written off, and everything apart from your wife has gone!" More anguish! Total devastation! How in the world would a person keep their sanity? Is it fair to suggest that Job experienced mental suffering?

We tend to enthusiastically "Amen" the sharing in His glory, but we are much more cautious when it comes to the fellowship of His suffering.

What would you do? The majority of us would jump up and down demanding answers from God, while others would start cursing and rebuking every devil they could think of. I admire Job's tremendous composure in spite of utter chaos. What did Job do? He bowed his head and in the FIRE OF ADVERSITY he worshipped. Let me tell you something, you will gain far more progress if you will bow your head and worship than you ever will by rebuking demons. Now, let's consider Job Chapter 2 verses 6 to 10. The first harrowing events had affected everything outside of Job. However, with this next testing, it was his body that God permits Satan to touch. His flesh is covered with boils. A more accurate diagnosis might be a type of elephantiasis. With this skin disease the body suffers great swelling – grotesque deformities, and boy, does he stink? He looked hideous and he smelt repulsive. Can you picture him sitting in poverty on a heap of ashes? Imagine him picking up some sharp object to scrape himself. He's trying to feel some relief.

His wife comes out. Any comfort here? Compassionless! The merciless woman looks at him for some moments and then suggests: "Why don't you curse God and die?" Job refused. Understandably, for Job's wife enough was enough. She's so embarrassed by the whole situation, all she wanted was for him to get it over and done with. Take note: in prosperity our friends know us, but in adversity we know our friends. Sadly, the Christian army is often the most noted for shooting its wounded.

Job's positive response to his wife's capitulation is "Shall we accept good from God and not trouble too?" He knew that a life of ease is neither the expectation nor the plan. In this situation, Job accepted everything that came to him as being from the hand of God. God was in absolute control. He still is. Nothing comes to us without God's approval. Job's pain-filled tragedies were both appointed and approved by God, although Job's friends thought they knew better. He experienced trial and testing because he was a godly man. And what did they say? "Job, you've sinned. Things like that don't happen to good, upright people. You've blown it somewhere. Brother, time to confess that sin." In some cases this diagnosis could well prove correct, but for Job it was completely wrong. It was because he walked with God that he was given this unique test of faith. The devil's argument was that if everything was taken from him, then he'd curse God to His face. God said: "Oh no he won't. There's much more to his character than that. He's a man of integrity!" And therefor God allowed the situation to happen.

Celebrating 10,000 Wheelchairs

Under darkened skies and working through a power cut, the Ghana team of Through the Roof* had the thrill of fitting a young man with Wheels for the World's 10,000th wheelchair. The recipient, Andrew, is 24 years old and has been disabled since childhood when he had convulsions which left him unable to walk. He lives with his mother, who was delighted that he would no longer have to crawl over rough grass and pot-holed roads. - a wheelchair which was rescued from landfill, repaired at Parkhurst Prison Workshop, and transported five thousand miles to help restore Andrew's dignity. What an amazing practical demonstration of God's love.

Since the first Wheels for the World trip to Albania in 1998, donors' support has brought chairs to 10,000 people, mobility aids to 12,000 more, and changed the lives of over 20,000 families, plus extended communities and churches, reaching 40,000 people with the Gospel. Sometimes, the scale of the need can be daunting, but 10,000 people who have found new freedom through the work donors have made possible are 10,000 reasons to keep pushing on for another 10,000 chairs!

They have been working with the Light Outreach Foundation in Tema since 2003, but this is the first distribution to the Central Region of Ghana and the Ashanti people around Kumasi. The team travelled to four centres over five days, and it was obvious that the need is huge as they distributed 128 wheelchairs, 4 buggies and 166 mobility aids. There's lots more to do in future visits, but for each recipient and family, it's a life-changing gift.

That gift of a wheelchair will make a huge difference to Obour who fell off his bicycle while cycling to work on the family farm 20 years ago and sustained spinal damage. He's been looked after by his brother and family ever since. When asked what difference his wheelchair would make he replied, "I shall not have to stay out in the rain and get wet, as I can push myself to shelter." Apparently the previous day he had been carried into the compound to sit in a chair, but when the sudden rainstorm started there was no one to move him, so he got very wet. His brother said that both had been given freedom, as Obour would no longer need carrying. His name means 'stone', but the radiant smile that broke out as he pushed himself for the first time was anything but stony!

Although at the start of the distribution the mostneedy were obvious by their absence, by the end, many clients were being carried in by family members, or crawling on the ground as news spread.

The team was excited to see local pastors with such a thirst for the Biblical principles of disability. This was partly due to having the same pastors all week, giving everyone time to establish meaningful relationships. One pastor was well known for leading missions and running crusades with an emphasis on praying for miracle healings. However, having worked with us for a week, he humbly acknowledged there was a need for practical intervention, and that he had been touched by witnessing how the gift of a mobility aid could also be in God's plan.

Dora, a 35 year-old lady who contracted polio when nine months old, told the therapist how her new wheelchair will give her opportunities she has never had before. When asked if there was anything the team could specifically pray for, she brought the team member to tears, asking that "her nature would continually be evermore changed into the nature of Jesus". It's humbling to see this lady, who had suffered so much all her life, having such love for Jesus.

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GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGHEST FOR THE SUCCESS OF THE PCFFD CAMP

Our theme this year was "Trusting Him" with inspiration from Proverbs 3:5 Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding.

As we were preparing for the Camp we completely entrusted everything to God. We kept on praying for the Camp to be a successful one for God's glory. And the Lord granted our request. The HOLY SPIRIT touched everyone during our sessions. We witnessed and felt God's amazing favour for all the campers and staff. The speakers delivered the Word effectively, and the campers testified that God's messages really touched their hearts. We were able to evangelize and minister to believers in strengthening their faith. There were 98 participants – campers and staff, all part of the victory of the Camp.

There were many great testimonies, such as the following from Lorenzo Alpay (a cane user/had polio) - My Christian wife brought me to her church many times. I used to sleep during the worship service, and when it was testimony time I would escape because I was afraid the Pastor might call me to testify. But now, I am confidently willing to share my experiences. I have learned so much from this Camp. Before I thought I was already saved because I had not done anything wrong to my neighbour, had been faithful to my wife, had served my fellowmen, and not expected anything in return, but I see sthat was not enough to save me. Here I learned the true meaning of Salvation, how I could be saved and be with God, and have an eternal life, and I accepted God as my Lord and Saviour. I learned the importance of forgiveness, allowed God to heal all my brokenness, asked forgiveness from Him and to forgive people who had hurt me. I also learned to entrust my life to Him and trust in His promises... And I will apply in my life all the spiritual things that I have learned. I am so thankful to Pastor Reynold Malinao who preached clearly the Word of God and to all the PCFFD team.



PRABHU & NANCY RAYAN

Prabhu was brought up by missionary parents in Chennai, India. He accepted the Lord at the age of 16. After completing his Postgraduate studies, he went to Bombay, intending to go to Canada, but on visiting one of the slums he heard God's call. Leaving everything, he started working among the slums.

Nancy was born to Christian parents and grew up in Bombay. She accepted the Lord at the age of 18 and dedicated her life to full time ministry. After completing her Master's degree in English and a Bachelor's degree in Education, Nancy was teaching, when she met Prabhu, and they were married in 1980.

It was in one of the slums in Bombay that Prabhu met a blind man, Param, and led him to the Lord; and it was during his baptism that Prabhu heard the Lord asking him, "Today, Param is added into My Body, but where are the millions of people with disabilities in My Body? In obedience to this call, he started the ministry among people with visual disabilities in the year 1980, calling it the India Fellowship for the Visually Handicapped, and extended it in 1990 to all people with disabilities, and also to other countries

India Fellowship for the Visually Handicapped (IFVH)

Since then Prabhu and Nancy have been sharing the vision with church leaders through seminars and workshops, and also training those who wish to work among people with disabilities. The vision has impacted more than 82 countries. Personally, they have pioneered and initiated this ministry in 43 countries. They also pioneered the production and distribution of Braille Scriptures in all the Indian languages through the Bible Society of India, and are now spearheading the same in other countries. The curriculum they have written was recommended by the late Dr John Stott to be used in all the Bible colleges. Their desire is to see every person with disability reached with the Gospel of Christ, and every church inclusive of people with disabilities. They are excited to see pastors reaching out to them with a change of attitude, as well as people with disabilities reaching out to their peers when they have accepted the Lord Jesus. Two key sentences they proclaim:

"The Gospel is not disabled that it cannot save people with disabilities" and "their rightful place is in the Church of God!"

Here are two of the testimonies in one of their recent newsletters:

Persecuted, but cannot withhold the happiness I have received!



Abhilash Kumar Gautam: I was born with visual disability

in a non-Christian family in Uttar Pradesh. I came in contact with Premraj, who gave me a Braille Bible and as I began reading, God's Word worked in my heart and I stopped participating in the

worship and rituals practised by my parents. After seeing my attitude, my parents started persecuting me and destroyed all the Braille Scriptures. They did not provide me food for a few days. So I fled from home and stayed in the house of my friend for a couple of weeks. During this hard time of persecution, I had no Bible to read, so I requested Premraj to make arrangement for a Talking Bible. I met him personally in Delhi. He taught me from the Bible for three days and provided me a talking Bible in January 2018. I had been listening to it carefully, and it also enabled others to listen to it during my bus and train journey. God's Word touched my heart. I accepted Jesus Christ as my Saviour and Lord in Feb 2018, and took water baptism on 1st April 2018. During my baptism I felt some light flashed upon me from Heaven. Now I am very much happy in my spirit, and have received boldness to stand for my faith in Christ Jesus. Henceforth, I shall be a witness for Jesus Christ to my friends.



I lost both eyes, but that cannot erase the joy in my heart!



I am Abhinandan Paswan from a staunch non-Christian family in Bihar, North India.

I was born with perfect eye-sight, but lost my sight in an accident when I was studying in class 7. On that fateful day I was playing with

my aunt on the terrace of our apartment and fell on a pillar with iron rods hitting my face.

On the spot, my left eye ball was gouged out, and my right eye ball was severely injured. In spite of treatment, my right eye was damaged and had to be removed. Somehow I managed to study up to 10th class in my home town. Later in the year 2014 I went to Delhi for continuing my higher secondary education. Premraj Nanda (IFVH North India Coordinator) met me in my hostel and shared the Gospel.

I had no peace, and had tried many times to end my life. It was at this time Prem invited me to attend the Gospel Retreat, where I understood the meaning of life and the way to eternal life. I began to read the Braille Bible which I received from Premraj, and was convinced that Jesus Christ is the only God, and received Him in my heart. I began to attend a nearby church regularly.

The Holy Spirit worked in me and I took immersion water baptism in the church I attended on Easter Sunday 1st April, 2018. After baptism I felt liberated in my body, newness in my mind and peace in my heart.

"The parts that seem to be **weak**....

Paul describes the Church as the Body of Christ, 'not made up of one part, but of many ... God has arranged the parts, each one of them just as He wanted them to be' (1 Cor.12). However, how is this divine arrangement worked out when one, or several, of the parts has a learning disability? Autism? Down Syndrome?

Donna Jennings shares her thoughts...

This is a question that we as parents and our church leadership in Windsor have been asking about my son Micah who is nine years old, has autism and severe learning disability. One of the most difficult aspects of parenting and caring for Micah has been including him appropriately in church. As we have been plunged into the world of learning disability and developed good friendships with other families, it has become clear that church is not always a place that welcomes and embraces people who are different - even this different. Where are the men, women, boys and girls with learning disabilities in our churches? If they are present at all... are they merely among us physically, or are we bringing them to Jesus at an appropriate level, helping them be befriended and loved, empowered to serve God in their own way?



Paul continues in 1 Corinthians 12 that 'those parts which seem to be weak are indispensable to the body and deserve higher honour.' He uses a form of the Greek 'TIO' - to honour, to lift up, to give value. Micah, in his disabilities, with his complex needs and dependency on others, because of his obvious weakness, Paul states is 'indispensable' to our church body at Windsor.

So we his parents, our friends and church leaders have been asking - not only how we can bring Micah to Jesus, minister to him, but also how he, because of disability can minister to us, bring us towards Jesus. How can we move from reading the Bible TO adults and children like Micah, towards reading the Bible WITH people like Micah - and in doing so, refresh and deepen our grasp of the Christian faith and what it means to be church together. Asking, how do we

recognise and honour Imago Dei in a non-verbal child or adult with complex needs? How does a person like Micah, who has few words, engage with THE Word?

My search to understand Micah's identity in God's sight, has led to my involvement in an organisation called TIO. TIO seeks to see Christian communities enriched by the inclusion of people with disability, through teaching, research and advocacy. We have been invited to many churches and parachurch groups around Northen and Southern Ireland to help people think through a theology of disability, and to support churches who need support as they work through 'inclusion' of individuals and families like my own, and explore their ecclesiology in light of learning disability.

My own church Windsor, has begun a journey with us, seeking to include Micah and several others with similar needs within our church body. Stepping beyond our church boundaries with a vision of building inclusive bridges into parts of our community otherwise excluded from church life, Windsor has set up a support/respite group for families like our own. There is huge potential for local churches to demonstrate Kingdom values, and to be enriched themselves by the intentional 'lifting up' or honouring the many children and adults like Micah living in our communities.

The Inclusive Gospel demands inclusive churches. As we seek to live out inclusive Gospel communities with families both in our congregations .. and those outside ... it is helpful for Baptist churches to have some of these questions on their radar.

A Tale of two families

Once there stood a vacant, but strategic shop lot, perched on the hilltop of OUG Parklane, Kuala Lumpur. Two tenants had moved in, but neither had stayed long. Little did anyone conceive that God had already planned to transform that reserved space into a "lighthouse", a "city on a hill", the Promised Land for His very special children... and this is how that marvellous plan was to include our family.



You are about to read a tale that has only just begun, a story we are privileged to live out, and this is the way it came to pass...

My husband, Hock Cheng, shown here, could not ignore the gentle nudges he had been sensing for months now, the restlessness in his spirit that some unfulfilled dream lay around the corner. He had not only heard, but oftentimes retold the stories of God at work in another's life – miracles of faith and provision that had happened to someone else. He longed to boast of "God Stories" in his own life. And he got precisely what he asked for.

In an ordinary upper room of a church building, fourteen young adults of different abilities had been working: a polite soft-spoken young gentleman with autism, a demure, smiling young lady with Down Syndrome, a pair of identical sisters, who in spite of learning challenges, had bright enquiring personalities... each individual a valuable member of the STAND family, special in his or her own way. On every workbench, a basket of straws awaited to be packed and sealed into narrow plastic bags - a mundane task, yet demanding concentration and precision from every trainee. And thus, it had been for the past six years since the inception of STAND - a production workshop for young adults with special needs. But here and now, in 2017, the paths of STAND and Hock Cheng would cross, and the destinies of these two families would be divinely redirected and fulfilled.

You see, one day the STAND family caught Hock Cheng's attention, and there and then God planted His big dreams for each of these young lives into Hock Cheng's heart. Why not elevate them to a whole new level?... from a production workshop to a

social enterprise?... from packing straws to making pies?... from trainees to employees, able to earn a living for themselves?... from people with disabilities to God's signs and wonders, overcoming great impossibilities? As for Hock Cheng... from directing missions in a church to heading a social enterprise for young adults with special needs in the marketplace?... from meeting people in his office, to creating exotic recipes in the commercial kitchen of STAND? As for our family... from a somewhat predictable and comfortable life, to a bumpy, yet exhilarating journey of faith that would radically change the way we know God, and experience the life of faith He beckons us to live?... Amazed? Indeed the work of an amazing God. Impossible? By no means, for with our God, all things are possible!

Today, that vacant lot now thrives with families finding new meaning to life. Christmas carols ring out through the premises as busy fingers painstakingly mould pastry into pies. *The store has God's fingerprints all over it and at long last, Hock Cheng is able to proclaim stories of his very own experiences:*

- How God has provided beyond expectation!
- How a kindly landlord was willing to let us occupy his shop lot at a sizably reduced rent, even when someone else had offered him much more for it.
- How God had called a young chef who owned her own bakery, into full time Christian service in a church. She had heard about STAND and selflessly offered us all her equipment, which turned out to be two thirds of our wish list! When the lorry arrived with freezers, oven, cooling racks, baking trays, mixer, it felt like Christmas in August!
- How the timely closing down of a popular food court in Malacca provided us with the exact remaining items on our start-up wish list, complete with special delivery right to STAND's doorstep!

- How a successful kindhearted interior designer lent her time and expertise to give our shop front an extreme makeover.
- ...and many more such divinely orchestrated connections at just the right moment!



It would be a lie to only tell stories of triumphs, for punctuating these accounts of faith are the sleepless nights and early mornings on our knees before the Father... for aren't we all human beings who waver in our trust, yet thankfully, beloved children of an ever faithful Father? He understands the frailty of our faith, which is not unlike the crumbly pastry that disintegrates in our fingers even when we try so hard to get it to hold firm... and yet, He chooses to surpass our expectations and surprise us anyhow!... by sending us angels in disguise, who came to stand with us in our hour of need, lending a hand, a utensil, an offering, a word of encouragement, a prayer, a valuable piece of advice and a listening ear, and placing orders even when our pies had a less than perfect appearance... each one of you has been a personal touch from God, a sign of His favour, a reminder that He is indeed Jesus whose name is called Immanuel, GOD WITH US, and that all we need to do is to take the next step and trust Him for the future we cannot see.

Last, but not least, we wish to pay particular tribute to two great heroes in our lives: Hock Cheng's dad, whose nod of approval was what we treasured immensely; he humbly offered to be our security guard watching over STAND. Even at his frail age of eighty-five, he still desired to be a part of what he knew God had birthed. Sadly, he bid us farewell on the 29th of September, 2017, before we could show him the dream come true. We miss him so much. And my Dad, who could never resist throwing himself wholeheartedly into new ventures, and who himself, as a young man, had run his own bakery - how appropriate it was, that dad's company undertook most of our renovation work at STAND. How he would have loved to have been an integral part of this endeavour!

Both our dads, still cheering us on from the gallery of heaven, as they continue to inspire us, the way they always have...
